INSPIRATION FROM THE GREAT

Gunatitanand Swami once asked Lord Swaminarayan, "Which is most superior: first, to engage in meditation; second, to behave as the atma (soul); third, to serve the ill; or fourth, to talk about God?" In response, Maharaj answers, "To talk about God is superior."

It was for the sake of future aspirants like us that the compassionate and visionary Lord Swaminarayan advocated to constantly engage in the talks of God. Following Lord Swaminarayan's wishes, Gunatitanand Swami arranged to deliver spiritual discourses throughout the day at Junagadh temple. In fact, Lord Swaminarayan had instructed all saints and devotees to visit Junagadh for one month out of every year to listen to Swami's discourses. Swami's sermons were so powerful and poignant that devotees from all over Gujarat would specially flock to Junagadh to listen to him. His down-to-earth and practical talks inspired listeners to walk a pious path.

On one occasion, Swami was delivering a discourse when several devotees arrived. Upon seeing Swami, the devotees began to prostrate on the rocky and thorn-filled ground. Another devotee advised them to stop since the thorns can pierce the skin and cause harm. Swami stopped the devotees from prostrating and said, "These are not the thorns that you should be worried about. If these thorns pierce your skin, they can be easily removed with a needle or pin, but the thorns at the bazaar (market) are even harder to remove."

The devotee then asked, "But Swami, the bazaar is always swept and cleaned everyday! How can there be thorns?"



With great sympathy and consideration, Swami replies, "You may not be aware, but thorns in the bazaar are very harmful. In the bazaar, there are thorns of immoral sights that damage our eyes. There are thorns of negative words that damage our ears. There are thorns of various odors that damage our sense of smell. There are thorns of impure contact that damage our sense of touch, and there are thorns of bazaar food that damage our sense of taste. If not alert, these thorns will corrupt our thoughts and actions. To remove these thorns, we must follow Lord Swaminarayan's commands and stay in the right company."

Conveying this simple but poignant analogy, Gunatitanand Swami revealed that if we do not remain vigilant in keeping the five senses positive, our minds and thoughts would surely become polluted. In this way, Swami provided clear, simple and practical solutions to countless problems in all aspects of life.
